Pets aged 1-7 years old only require a full check up once a year, but a senior pet 8-10 plus years will require a health check twice per year.

Preventing Puppy Separation Anxiety

With everyone stuck at home, getting a puppy right now could be an ideal time. With the lockdown in place you probably have the time to bond with them and get them used to your home. But a puppy that is never left alone can grow up with separation anxiety. The sound of a crying dog left alone is heartbreaking and once they start, changing this crying habit can be extremely hard. Prevention is always best, so a little training right now can be your best way to avoid this phenomenon. Set up a safe area where your puppy has plenty of fun toys, a soft bed, and a few chews and a bowl of water. Then go into the other room and shut the door for a while. Once they get used to that, you can leave them in a safe room and go outside (so they can't smell you in the other room) and go for a short walk. They will soon get to know that you always come back and they won't fret as much. The trick is to leave them with something like a stuffed Kong to chew on so that they enjoy the time alone. Soft music can help, as can rewarding good behaviour rather than focusing on the negatives. While this Pandemic has us locked uptight, it is a good time to initiate a training program for your young pup. Use this time creatively, set your puppy up for success.

BLADDER STONES ARE A COMMON PET PROBLEM.

Many pets are susceptible to bladder stones, including your cat, dog, and guinea pigs. The problem these stones cause includes pain, inflammation, infection, bleeding, trouble urinating, and in a severe case, your pet may not be able to urinate at all! At this stage, it becomes a life-threatening emergency. Many types of bladder stones can form, and treatment is dependant on the size and the type of stone. Symptoms include discomfort and trouble urinating. Licking at the urinary tract opening or crying when they urinate is another sign that all is not well. Blood in the urine is a giveaway sign for bladder stones.

Treatment consists of dietary changes and medications to dissolve the stones depending on the type of stone your pet has. Flushing small stones out of the bladder with saline may also be done. Surgery Is the alternative for stones that cannot be dissolved or ultrasonically breaking the stones apart is also an option. If your pet shows any of the above symptoms please bring them in for an examination and we can help them to overcome this distressing problem.

CASE STUDY – SCOOTER AND GRASS SEEDS!

Grass seeds are a problem for long hair dogs, as the seeds can get into their toes, ears, lips or body. These seeds have a corkscrew angle that allows them to drill into your dog's skin. If you try to pull them out, they will usually break off leaving the seed head in the body. These will then 'travel' into the body and the bloodstream. Eventually they can end up in the heart or chest cavity etc. They are painful for your dog, and they produce an array of health problems. If you see seeds stuck in your dog, don't try to remove them - bring your dog to us so we can see where the seed is and can remove it completely. Thankfully it is a seasonal problem with only certain grasses, and one that affects long coated dogs with fluffy feet. If you cannot prevent them running around, you can get socks or special booties to protect their feet, or you could mow the grass! Check out the <u>video link</u> to learn more about this issue.

PETS WITH RED, ITCHY EYES - AND WHAT TO DO ABOUT IT!

Does your pet have red eyes, lots of tears or pus oozing from the eye, or perhaps they are trying to scratch their eye? Does the eye look cloudy or have a glassy look? If so, your pet has an infection or health issue with their eyes. Never wait to see if the problem gets better on its own, as it rarely happens. If the eye is infected and left untreated, the eye may develop an ulcer which is very painful for your pet. It can also affect their eyesight.

Causes of eye problems could arise from allergies such as pollen, grass, or fleas, and mites. Conjunctivitis or 'pink eye' is a bacterial infection that affects the eye and tear ducts. There may be something trapped within the eyelid such as a foreign body such as a grass seed. Cherry eye is something that both cats and dogs can develop. It is a 'prolapse' of the 3rd eyelid – the membrane that protects their eye. Sometimes this third eyelid can become swollen, red, and inflamed.

The safest and quickest way to deal with all the above is to bring in your pet into see us. Often the infection is minor and easily fixed. Never leave an infection untreated or try to remove something from your cat's or dog's eye – we can do it quickly and safely.
